

What are the EIA (Agricultural) Regulations?

The purpose is to protect priority and semi-natural habitats from agricultural intensification.

When do the Regulations apply?



Definitions

Uncultivated land is any area where no physicial or chemcial cultivation activities have taken place in the last 15 years. Physical cultivation is considered to be agricultural soil-disrupting activities and chemical cultivation is considered to be the enhancement of the soil through the addition of increased levels of organic and inorganic fertilizers and soil improvers including lime.

Your Project and the Regulations

Listed below are methods used for restoration of grassland/heathland and how they fit with the Regulations;

Cutting - No screening application is needed for commencement of cutting activities but if the proposal is to introduce intensive grazing on uncultivated land, particularly if supplementary feed is going to be used, a screening application should be submitted.

Wildflower Seed - The addition of wildflower seeds during semi-natural habitats restoration projects, through green hay, brush-harvested seed, wildflower seed mixture, or heather brash from a donor site, will have no impact on the soil and therefore, no screening application needs to be submitted.

Bare Ground - If bare ground is being created, a screening application does not need to be submitted, as long as a clear audit trail can be provided to indicate that all the activities undertaken through this process have not increased the productivity of the land for agriculture.

Scrub - Scrub is defined as a semi-natural area under the Regulations and therefore, if any project includes clearance of scrub of an area over 2 hectares a screening application needs to be submitted.

Invasive Species - If non-native invasive species are being cleared <u>only</u> no screening application will be needed.

What do you need to do if your project does come under the Regulations?

You will need to submit a <u>Screening Application Form</u> and await a response before proceeding.

Responses can take up to 35 days so please plan ahead. There is no charge for the screening process and decisions are valid for 3 years.
